Blue Ribbon Honey

The county fairs were always a lot of fun, but when I first started entering exhibits, my items just weren't what the judges were looking for. Over the years, I've studied, been mentored, and I finally became a Maryland state honey judge last year. Here are a few tips on how to ensure your honey gets noticed.

Follow the rules. If it says, "Three glass jars with pink plastic lids" then you should enter three glass jars with pink plastic lids otherwise points are deducted.

Honey must be clean. Do not filter it with cheesecloth as it leaves behind a filament.

Jars must also be extremely clean. Use the dishwasher and let it air dry. Don't use paper towels or dishcloths as they leave particles behind.

Fill the jar to the top edge of the bottom bead. It needs to be a full jar of honey with no foam or debris floating on the top. Lids must be clean. Pro tip: cover the top of the jar with plastic wrap and then put your lid on. When you get to the fair, remove the plastic wrap and put your brand-new, clean lid back on the jar. If you wash your lids, make sure that you hand dry them immediately because they can rust (which would be a point deduction).

The water content should be less than 18%. Lower moisture content earns you more points. Anything higher than 18.6 (at most fairs) could cause disqualification. Honey that is too wet will ferment.

No labels. There should be no identifying marks.

The honey show superintendent will carefully handle your jars of honey so that judges see it exactly as you brought it. There are so many fantastic items that you can enter at the fair: photographs, art projects, wax candles, cosmetics, propolis, etc. Just check out the catalog! You could win not only ribbons but some bragging rights as well!
